I would like to take this opportunity to briefly explain a recent, new approach to some of our classrooms which builds on our work in the BOX. Setting up our classrooms as flexible, inter-changeable spaces allows pupils to learn in ways that cater to their individual needs, preferences, and learning styles. This involves our pupils choosing different workspaces within their classes, collaborating in groups, or learning independently. Giving pupils this choice helps increase engagement, participation, teamwork and communication. It allows them to take ownership of their learning journey and gives them a sense of motivation and responsibility. The results so far, have blown us away. Pupils are more engaged and happier to learn in a space they feel more comfortable in and we have already seen a positive impact on academic progress as well. We will continue to monitor, test and review this approach and I will continue to update you as we roll it out across the school.






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## Staff Spotlight

### **Fledglings 1**

In the past fortnight, Fledglings 1 have enjoyed learning all about the undersea world. They've been searching for various sea creature pictures in a messy tray and playing with miniature undersea world figures. The children have particularly relished interacting with different beach scenes in the messy tray. Additionally, they've been honing their threading skills to create paper chains that they attach to a large octopus, as well as crafting their own sun catcher fish. They've been using a variety of stencils to make marks on foil and listening to tales about the ocean depths. Creating their own pufferfish, squids, and shell fans has been a hit. The children have been busy rescuing sea creatures from a green tray. Exploring sensory bags to experience their textures has been an engaging activity. They've also been decorating rainbow fish for our undersea display. The children have had great fun using their bodies to move in different ways on the soft play equipment.















### Fledglings 2

Fledglings 2 have been amazingly engrossed with space! They have loved looking at different planets, the sun and the moon and talking about a rocket launch and watching it on the iPad. They have enjoyed pretending to be astronauts in our space centre using the space controls to launch. Lots of fun with free flow activities such as making their own handprint aliens, paper plate aliens, threading planets using paper plate, marble paint planets, planet suncatchers and lots more! Our tuff tray have been filled daily with all sorts of materials such as glitter and salt, sand, pasta, rice and gloop. The children have also enjoyed fun activities threading shooting stars, sequencing of stars, big and small aliens, matching coloured aliens, matching rockets and most of all they have loved listening to space stories!







#### **Lower Robins**

Lower Robin's have had a wonderful time since returning after the half term break! We focused on the topic of 'Fruit' last week, and the children engaged in various enjoyable activities. They had fun creating art with fruit by using chopped fruit to make paintings, making yummy fruit kebabs, and even trying their hand at chopping fruit to make a smoothie, which they loved drinking afterwards! The children also got to explore different fruits, sharing with their friends their favourites. This week, we dived into the story of 'Stick Man', and the Lower Robin's had a great time venturing out in search of their very own sticks. They had a great time crafting their own 'Stick Men' using small sticks and glue. The children really got into the story, joining in with the familiar phrases!





#### **Upper Robins**

Last week in Upper Robins, the children have been learning about 'people who help us'. We have been talking about the different people who help us and what jobs they do, from police officer to a doctor. They have also been pretending to put a fire out using red shaving foam and water, matching different people who help use puzzles together, pretending to be a doctor, helping make the poorly babies better, making fire engines, police cars and ambulances. They have enjoyed making fire officers hats using different materials.

This week in Upper Robins the children have thoroughly enjoyed the topic of superhero's. They have particularly loved dressing up has their favourite superhero and spending in our makeshift Bat cave, making up their own favourite superhero story and games. Also this week we have been measuring the size of different superheroes, trying to free them from being all tied up with elastic bands, practicing their number recognition skills by training their eyes/throwing skills and getting super fit to be a superhero by taking part in superhero training.











### **Skylarks - Green**

The children on the Green side of Skylarks have been engaged in a wide variety of activities since the last edition of the Nutshell. With the conclusion of 'Number Week', we focused on the festival of Chinese New Year. An extensive selection of 'hands-on', visual activities consolidated the children's understanding of the diverse nature of the world and its people. These included imaginative play in our Chinese restaurant, dragon dancing in the hall, making Chinese lanterns and sampling noodles using our chopsticks. 'Healthy Smiles Week' coincided with this celebration too, with the children learning the importance of eating and drinking healthily and regular toothbrushing. We celebrated St. Valentine's Day and Shrove Tuesday in February too, enjoying tossing some pancakes and then eating some more for snack. Yummy! Our next topic of 'Construction' proved a massive hit! Everybody participated keenly in associated activities such as working hard in the 'builders' yard', measuring, building and drawing up plans, manoeuvring different media with the diggers in the tuff tray, replicating Duplo models, continuing alternating patterns and creating our names using lettered bricks.

This week we started looking at fairy tales, transforming our home corner into a castle and building up our own storylines at the 'fairy garden' table.
















#### **Skylarks - Orange**

They had so much fun making and mixing lotions and potions, sharing their concoction ideas, and exploring different textures and petals during messy play. It was amazing to see them expanding their imaginative play in such wonderful ways. We also had group discussions about the various castles the kids had visited. They absolutely loved playing with the Fairytale small world set we had out all week, pretending to be princesses, princes, and even unicorns. We kept busy practising our cutting skills by crafting princess dresses and shields. The Skylarks really embraced this theme and had a blast!













## OAK

What creatures do we share our world with?

Oak has had an excellent start to the term by introducing our new topic: "What creatures do we share our world with?". In the first week of term, we engaged the children with exciting activities centred around farm animals and woodland creatures. The children planted cress, which they later harvested and tasted. They also baked hedgehog bread rolls and made butter by shaking whipping cream, which they enjoyed with their rolls. Additionally, they painted muddy pigs, created repeating patterns using different vegetable prints, and used handprints to make chickens. Throughout our first week, we explored wool from various sheep to understand the purposes of farm animals. We discussed the origin of different foods and even watched a video demonstrating cows being milked. Moving on to the second week, we delved into minibeasts! The children enjoyed examining items with microscopes and discovering the unique life cycle of insects compared to our own. We crafted snail Fibonacci spirals from paper and used junk modelling to invent our very own minibeasts.

Polly calculated that she could hop at a speed of 2 m/s whilst Sam found he could sprint at almost 5 m/s.


## Year 8




